~~Rawls~~ Rawls: Absence of Justice in the Deprived person.

P. 106: There can be an absence of the sense of justice which is vital to the working of Rawls' society, among those who are socially deprived; for the development of that ~~xxx~~ sense of justice should be part of the upbringing within a family & circumstances where justice is believed to exist in society.

[REG] This idea could be extended to the times when the ~~xi~~ lower class person did not even have a sense of citizenship, since he did not ~~partake~~ partake in the decisions of public affairs in any way. The sense of justice, then, was tied to the family upbringing exclusively. One wonders whether in this situation, where there is little or no civic operation by the family, there can be given any sense of citizenship even though individual morality is engendered. The family in this situation is almost an obstacle to the state. In countries such as France, however, where the division between the public and the private spheres is rooted in the law, the separation of family and state is legalized. This in contrast to the Anglo-American system of common law, where the distinction between public and private spheres is not formalized, and where the political effectiveness of the individual is much more apparent.
